Tartakower wisely said: "Tactics are what you do when there is something to do. Strategy is what you do when there is nothing to do." True chess mastery demands the ability to always find the best move, regardless of the position, and a deep understanding of strategic nuances.

This book is designed to boost your positional understanding to new heights!

In this book, you'll find 500 examples from real games, sorted into four different levels. We've picked the best and most helpful examples from games played in the second half of 2024 and the first half of 2025. Most of these games were played by very strong players.

This book continues the journey we started last year, using the same concept. Our goal here is to introduce new ideas, creating a complete and comprehensive learning experience when combined with the previous book.

These exercises are perfect for intermediate and club players aiming to reach a FIDE rating of 2200-2300. They're also incredibly helpful for CM and FM-level players aspiring to become International Masters or Grandmasters.

This isn't just a collection of random positions. We've worked hard to bring you a wide variety of strategic ideas, from the simplest and most common positional thoughts to very complex and deep plans. Prepare to dive into the depths of modern chess and discover the secrets of strategic mastery!

All positions are divided according to their difficulty on:

- * Easy positions. We are asking for basic positional understanding.
- ** Medium positions. You are supposed to find a bit deeper and longer plan.

*** Hard positions. You have to apply more advanced principles, calculate well and find a subtle and more difficult idea.

**** Very hard positions. It is more complicated. You should calculate more, find more advanced ideas and you have to take a lot of circumstances into account in order to find the right move.

While doing these tasks you should pay attention to the following:


- · Who is better
- · What is the worst placed piece in your position
- King safety (both yours and your opponent's)
- · What is your opponent's next move and what is your opponent's plan
- · Where are the weaknesses (both yours and your opponent's)
- · Consequences of exchanges in the position

How to study this book? You should simply try to solve puzzles one by one. That's all. After you find the move and decide what would you do in a certain position, you should go to the back pages and compare your solution with the solution in the book. We made sure that the solutions and the moves we put are precise and easy to understand. Also, we put a lot of diagrams to help you visualize better. Our personal advice is to put every position on the board and try to solve it in the old-fashioned way. But, it is totally fine to solve the positions directly from the book if you are not at home or you simply don't have chess board with you. The way we created everything allows you to do it in the both ways.

So, let's study chess strategy in the more dynamic and fun way!
